
Skansie Brothers Netshed Annual Report 2020



The Skansie brothers (Antone and Vince) rest outside the netshed in 1990. It was the last time they bottom-painted the hull of their fishing vessel, the Avalon. The brothers lived in the Skansie home built by their father, Andrew, until they passed (2001 and 2002). As was the wish of the family, the netshed, house, and grounds were purchased by the City in 2002 to become Skansie Brothers Park. Preservation of the Netshed signaled the community's commitment to preserving local maritime culture.

Mission Statement

"An educational organization dedicated to the preservation and advancement of fishing family heritage as it exists in the people, places, vessels, skills, and stories of Gig Harbor's commercial fishing industry."



Skansie Netshed Foundation (SNF) is a 501 c(3) non-profit organization established in 2015 to preserve and protect the Skansie Netshed and its contents. When the State of Washington registered the entire Skansie site on the National Register, the Foundation secured a 20-year lease with the City of Gig Harbor to ensure seasonal public access to the facility.

SNF Volunteers meet monthly to maintain the shed and its contents. All proceeds from special events, donations, and retails sales (hats, t-shirts, aprons, and posters) are reinvested to create public programming and educational materials. Projects include oral histories, database development, brochures, and audio-visual materials. The Foundation is self-sustaining with no "supplemental funding" from Gig Harbor City Government.



As early as 1910, Gig Harbor's first netsheds began appearing along the waterfront. These modest over-water structures and docks of wood were constructed as storage sheds for fishing nets and gear used by local fishermen.





THE FLEET

As one of the few community-based fishing fleets remaining on Puget Sound, the Gig Harbor Commercial Fishing Fleet is the oldest. It was established by Croatian immigrants who imported fishing techniques and traditions from the Dalmatian Coast of what is now Croatia. Their influence across six generations forged the town's local economy and shaped the development of commercial fishing for decades. Today, approximately 18 local purse seiners fish from Alaska to California.

The first Blessing of the Fleet was the occasion for "Harbor Holidays" in 1970.



Today, only 17 netsheds remain but the Harbor still boasts the largest inventory of historic netsheds on all of Puget Sound with seven still in use by our Commercial Fishing Fleet.


The Foundation consists of 9 Board Members, 45 Affliliates, and approximately 12 Trained Docents who volunteer a minimum of four days each month to maintain summer hours.





Since Skansie Netshed Foundation opened the doors of the Shed in the summer of 2015, the total number of visitors continues to increase; nearly 16,000 in the Summer of 2019. Visitors from around the world learn the importance of Gig Harbor's iconic Netsheds, recognized at the Library of Congress in Washington, D.C., and listed on the National Register.






NET MENDING DEMONSTRATIONS

Net mending is an important fisherman's skill for patching holes in nets due to seasonal wear and tear during the fishing season. A "kushi" needle is used to complete the task. Originally, these mending needles were carved from wood. Today's needles are made from durable plastic. The sons and daughters of crew members and skippers were often responsible for keeping the needles filled with twine and ready for use.








VIDEOS and ARTIFACTS

Videos shot by local fishermen run on a continuous loop during open hours.

Each item in the shed is tagged, numbered, and described as part of the Netshed's inventory of artifacts collected by the Skansie Brothers.








• INTERACTIVE SEINE DISPLAY

Fishing for salmon using a seine net is one of the main methods for harvesting North Pacific Salmon. Vistors get a hands-on experience with this sample purse seine net. The Interpretive signage illustrates how commerical fishing vessels use their skiff to make each "set."

CAULKING STATION

Caulking is a technique whereby the gaps between the hull strakes or deck planks are sealed using cotton and okum. Visitors can try their hand at this work at the caulking display.





KNOT TYING STATION

Using specific knots for a particular purpose is another required fisherman's skill. Practicing the tying of various knots is possible at the Netshed knot-tying station. Finding a "Monkey Paw" among the many items on display is a great challenge for the eagle-eyed visitor.

SNF volunteers partner with the **Downtown Waterfront Alliance** at the annual Tree-Lighting Event at Skansie Park.




• SKANSIE NETSHED DINNER

Volunteers from the Foundation decorate the Netshed and welcome the general public, as candy is disbursed to thousands of children that participate in this annual downtown event.






SCHOOL VISITS








